

I) Crisis, Temporality and History

- ICOM (International Council of Museums)
- 83% of the respondents expect their budget to largely decrease, 30% expect a reduction in staff, 13% fear their museum will close.
- Changing perception of time



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


COVID 19 and Rapid Response Collecting





- The National Archives of Australia also captures interaction between government and general public


Global Pandemic Map


